So it was determined in the affirmative.

The bill, entitled, An act to increase the allowance of jurymen of the general court, and the several county courts in this state, was read a second time, and the question put, That the said bill do pass? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:

So it was determined in the affirmative.

The bill, entitled, An act for building a court-house and gaol for Allegany county, at the town of Cumberland, was read a second time, and passed.

The bill, entitled, An act to establish the road leading from Crooked Run, in Worcester county, to Saint-Martin's Landing, as a public road, was read the second time, and passed.

Which said several bills were sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The president communicates to the senate a letter from Samuel A. Otis, secretary of the senate of the United States, enclosing a copy of the journals of the senate of the United States at the second session of the second congress.

The bill, entitled, An act to confirm the title of certain lots of ground to the society of people called Quakers, in Baltimore-town, whereon is their meeting-house and burying-ground, and an act for altering the time of holding the orphans court in Allegany county, were severally read a second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

A Supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the inspection of salted provisions exported and imported from and to the town of George-town, in Montgomery county, was read the second time, and passed with the following proposed amendments:

Amendments proposed. Strike out the preamble, and insert "Whereas the act to which this is a supplement imposes no penalty on persons offering salted provisions for sale in said town, except for exportation." And strike out all of the enacting clause after the word "Maryland" in the first line, to the word "that" in the sixth line of the said clause.

Which said bill, with amendments, was sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, A Supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the relief of the poor in Dorchester and Somerset counties, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, November 22, 1793: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates likewise delivers the act for altering the time of holding the orphans court in Allegany county, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, November 25, 1793: Read the first and second time by especial order and will pass.

Which was ordered to be engrossed.

The resolution in favour of Jonathan Hagar, was read the second time and assented to.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

T U E S D A Y, November 26, 1793.

**T**HE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The resolution in favour of Jonathan Hagar, was sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following resolution:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, NOVEMBER 25, 1793.

Whereas it is represented to this general assembly by the governor and council of this state, that the sudden arrival at Baltimore of large numbers of strangers from Saint-Domingo, with an armed force, during last summer, had created reasonable fears in the inhabitants of said town for their peace and tranquillity, and occasioned an application from the magistracy of the said town for the use of the public arms, which the peculiar circumstances of the case induced the executive to comply with, although not strictly authorized by any existing law of the state so to do; therefore, **RESOLVED**, That this general assembly do approve the conduct of the executive in granting the temporary use of the public arms to the volunteer companies of militia in the said town, under the conditions stated in his excellency's letter of the 7th instant.
