The resolution in favour of Jonathan Hagar, was sent to the house of delegates by the clerk. The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following resolution:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, NOVEMBER 25, 1793. Whereas it is represented to this general assembly by the governor and council of this state, that the sudden arrival at Baltimore of large numbers of strangers from Saint-Domingo, with an armed force, during last summer, had created reasonable sears in the inhabitants of said town for their peace and tranquillity, and occasioned an application from the magistracy of the said town for the use of the public arms, which the peculiar circumstances of the case induced the executive to comply with, although not strictly authorised by any existing law of the state so to do; therefore, RESOLVED, That this general assembly do approve the conduct of the executive in granting the temporary use of the public arms to the volunteer companies of militia in the faid town, under the conditions stated in his excellency's letter of the 7th instant.
