

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, DECEMBER 26, 1793.

Whereas the duties of the council to the governor will be considerably increased by the act to regulate and discipline the militia of this state, and it being reasonable that some compensation should be made for the duties required under the said act; therefore, RESOLVED, That each member of the council be allowed the ensuing year the sum of fifty pounds current money in addition to the salary ascertained by law, and that the same be paid in the manner the law now directs.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The amendments to the bill, entitled, An act to erect Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county, into a city, and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof, were read and acceded to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed, with the amendments.

The bill, entitled, An act providing a remedy for the creditors of persons dying seized of land without known heirs, was read the second time, and will not pass.

The bill, entitled, An act relative to appeals to be prosecuted, or injunctions to be obtained, by executors or administrators, was read the second time, and will pass.

The bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Charles Maccubbin, of the city of Annapolis, was read the second time, and will not pass.

All which said bills, together with the resolution in favour of the members of the council, were sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the engrossed bills from No. 1 to 63, (except No. 10, 11, 14, 16, 29, 30, 34, 35, 45, 53, 56, 57, 58, 59, 60,) with the paper bills thereof; which engrossed bills were thus severally endorsed; "By the house of delegates, December 26, 1793: Read and assented to.

The resolution approving the conduct of Thomas Hyde, was read the second time, and dissented to.

The bill, entitled; An act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, was read the second time, and will pass with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed. In the second line of the first page, strike out the words "Abraham George Hammond." In the ninth line of the same page, strike out the words "Gavin Hamilton Smith."

The bill, entitled, A Supplement to an act, entitled, An act to freighten and amend the several public roads in Harford county, and for other purposes, was read the second time and will pass, and, with the last mentioned bill and amendments, together with the resolution approving of the conduct of Thomas Hyde, was sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, A Further supplement to an act, entitled, An act for marking and bounding lands, was read the second time, and will pass.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the bill, entitled, An act to repeal a part of the act of assembly therein mentioned, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, December 21, 1793: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, DECEMBER 27, 1793.

Whereas the duties of the clerk of the council to the governor will be considerably increased by the appointments under the act to regulate and discipline the militia of this state, and it is just and reasonable that some compensation should be given him for his additional trouble, RESOLVED, That the clerk of the council shall and he is hereby authorized to charge one shilling and ten-pence halfpenny for each commission, and the said fee to be paid by the person accepting the same.
