

Amendments proposed. At the end of the second page insert as follows: "Provided, that if any person shall think himself aggrieved by the alteration of any old road, or by the running of any new road, he may appeal from the determination of the said justices to the next county court of Cecil county, who shall have power either to reject or confirm the road ascertained by the said justices, or to make such alteration thereof as they may think proper, and their decision shall be final." Sixth page, line 11, strike out from the word "recovered" to the end of the line, and insert "by indictment in the county court." Seventh page, strike out from the word "no" in the 14th line to the word "more" in the same line. Seventh page, strike out from the word "pounds" in the 5th line from the bottom to the end of the page. Eighth page, strike out from the word "force" in the second line to the word "thereafter" inclusive in the third line, and insert "till the first Monday in March, seventeen hundred and ninety-five."

The bill, entitled, An act for establishing a company for opening and extending the navigation of the river Pocomoke, and for other purposes, was read the second time, and will not pass.

On motion, James M^cHenry, Esquire, brings in and delivers to the president a bill, entitled, An act for establishing a company for opening and extending the navigation of the river Pocomoke; which was read, and referred to the consideration of the next session of assembly.

The bill, entitled, An act to confirm the title of the select vestry of Saint-John's parish, in Prince-George's county, in and to three acres of ground in said parish, was read the second time and will pass with the proposed amendment.

Amendment proposed. At the end of the bill insert as follows: "Provided, that nothing in this act shall prejudice the right of any person who may think him or herself injured by such survey, and who shall commence an action against the said vestry for the recovery of his or her claim within five years from the passing of this act, nor shall the right of any person be prejudiced, who, at the time of passing this act, is under the age of twenty-one years, non compos mentis, out of the state, or a feme covert, if such person, or his or her heirs or assigns, shall prosecute an action against the said vestry for the recovery of his or her claim within five years after he or she shall arrive at the age of twenty-one years, or become compos mentis, or return to this state, or become uncovert, or die during such infancy, insanity, absence from the state, or coverture."

The bill, entitled, An act to take away the donations heretofore granted to Washington and Saint-John's colleges, was read the second time, and will not pass.

The bill, entitled, An act for straightening and amending the road from the town of Cumberland, in Allegany county, which intersects the road leading from Union-town, in Pennsylvania, at the Winding-Ridge, was read the second time, and will pass.

The resolution respecting the court-house in Talbot county, was read the second time, and assented to.

The instructions from the house of delegates to John Henry and Richard Potts, Esquires, for opening the doors of the senate of the United States, were read the second time by especial order and dissented to.

On motion, William Tilghman, Esquire, brings in and delivers to the president the following resolutions; which were read the first and second time by especial order and assented to.
