The letter from the visitors and governors of St. John's college, enclosing a general account of their receipts and expenditures, was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates, and sent there by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers to the clerk of the senate a bill, entitled, An act to compel the attendance of the members of the general assembly, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, November 18, 1794: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The president communicates to the senate a letter from his excellency the governor, enclosing communications from the agent of the bank stock for the consideration of the legislature; which was read.

The resolution approving the conduct of the executive respecting the bank stock, with the communications relative thereto, was referred to Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Robert Smith and John Campbell, Esquires, to consider and report thereon.

The orders of the day are postponed until to-morrow.

On motion, ORDERED, That Robert Smith, Charles Goldsborough and John Campbell, Esquires, be appointed a committee to bring in a bill respecting writs of inquiry.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

F R I D A Y, November 21, 1794.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The president communicates to the senate a letter from John Callahan, register of the land-office of the western shore, enclosing an account of the taxes received by him on the several proceedings in the land-office, by virtue of an act of assembly passed November session, seventeen hundred and ninety-two; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates, and sent there by the clerk.

Agreeable to the orders of the day, the senate having previously qualified according to the constitution and form of government, proceeded to the election of senators in the room of Brice Thomas B. Worthington, Benjamin Stoddert and William Tilghman, Esquires. The ballot-box was prepared, the tickets deposited therein, and on examination thereof it appeared, that Thomas Sim Lee, William Cooke, and Matthew Tilghman, Esquires, were duly elected members of the senate.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers to the clerk of the senate a bill, entitled, An act to extend the public road leading from Herring Creek, in Worcester county, to the north end of Synepuxent, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, November 21, 1794: Read the first and second time by especial order and will pass.

"By order, W. HARWOOD, clk."

Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table;

The bill, entitled, An act to settle and ascertain the salary of members of the council for the ensuing year, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act to revive and aid the proceedings of the orphans court of Queen-Anne's county, was read the second time, and passed with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed. Strike out from the word "continued," in the first enacting clause, to the end of that clause, and insert as follows: "And shall be in the same state and condition, to all intents and purposes, as the same would have been in if the said court had met on the said second Tuesday of December last, and the said pleas, process and proceedings, had been duly continued by regular and lawful adjournments from time to time." After the word "last" in the 19th line, insert as follows: "Either in cases then depending, or since commenced."

On motion, ORDERED, That the bill, entitled, An act for a further addition to Baltimore-town, have a second reading on Friday the 28th instant.

The resolution approving the conduct of the executive in calling out the militia, was read the second time and unanimously assented to.

The president communicates to the senate a letter from Matthew Tilghman, Esquire, informing him of his acceptance of a seat in the senate; which was read.

The honourable Matthew Tilghman, Esquire, appeared in the senate, and qualified before Allen Quynn, Esquire, one of the justices of the peace for Anne-Arundel county, by taking the several oaths required by the constitution and form of government, subscribing a declaration of his belief in the christian religion, and by taking an oath to support the constitution of the United States.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.
