BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, DECEMBER 15, 1794.

RESOLVED, That the auditor of this state, on or before the first day of October next, liquidate the claims of the citizens of this state against William and Robert Molleson, and ascertain the proportions which each shall be entitled to out of the monies arising from the sale of their confiscated property; and the said auditor shall thereupon draw orders on the treasurer, in favour of the said creditors, for their respective proportions, provided that notice be given by the said auditor in at least two of the news-papers of this state for six weeks successively, for the creditors of the said Mollesons to exhibit their claims on or before the first day of June next, and no claim exhibited subsequent to that period shall be liquidated by him.
