

## P O S T M E R I D I E M.

The senate met:

The resolutions relative to the statute laws of Great-Britain, the resolution respecting Robert Goldsborough, and the resolution respecting the British statutes, were all sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates brings in and delivers to the clerk of the senate a bill, entitled, An act to establish and regulate a market in Charles-town, in Charles county, and to prevent persons from suffering goats, hogs and geese, to go at large in the said town, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, December 18, 1794: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table:

"By the house of delegates, December 20, 1794: Read the second time and will pass.

Which said bill was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act to provide for the appointment of commissioners for the regulation and improvement of Easton, in Talbot county, and to establish and regulate a market at the said town, was read the second time and will pass.

On motion, James M'Henry, Esquire, brings in and delivers a bill, entitled, An act to alter such part of the constitution and form of government which prevents persons conscientiously scrupulous of taking an oath from being members of the legislature, electors of the senate, or to hold offices of profit and trust; which said bill was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Thomas Clark, was read the second time and will pass.

The clerk of the house of delegates brings in and delivers to the clerk of the senate a bill, entitled, An act for the establishment and regulation of the levy courts in the several counties of this state, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, December 20, 1794: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The resolution in favour of Samuel Worthington, was read the second time and assented to.

The bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the better administration of justice in the several county courts of this state, was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill, entitled, An act to alter such part of the constitution and form of government which prevents persons conscientiously scrupulous of taking an oath from being members of the legislature, electors of the senate, or to hold offices of profit and trust, was read the second time by especial order and will pass.

The bill, entitled, An act to alter such parts of the constitution and form of government which prevent persons from being members of the legislature, electors of the senate, or to hold offices of profit and trust, other than those who shall take an oath, was read the second time and will not pass.

The clerk of the house of delegates brings in and delivers to the clerk of the senate a bill, entitled, An act further extending the time for making returns of certain certificates and plots, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, December 18, 1794: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

"By the house of delegates, December 20, 1794: Read the second time and will pass.

"By order, W. HARWOOD, clk."

And the following resolution:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, DECEMBER 20, 1794.

RESOLVED, That the interest on one hundred and three pounds ten shillings, due from Brooke Beall, clerk of Montgomery county, and Edward Burges's his security, to the state of Maryland, be remitted, on payment of the said sum and costs; provided the said sum of one hundred and three pounds ten shillings, with costs of suit, be paid on or before the first day of May next.
