NOVEMBER SESSION, 1795.

Being the SIXTH SESSION of the FOURTH SENATE.

ON Monday the second day of November, seventeen hundred and ninety-five, being the day appointed by the constitution and form of government for the meeting of the general assembly of this state, there appeared in the senate,

Who adjourn till to morrow morning.

T U E S D A Y, November 3, 1795.

THE same members appeared as on yesterday. The honourable John Campbell and William Winder, Esquires, appeared in the senate.

A sufficient number to proceed to business being convened, they severally qualified in the presence of each other, before Allen Quynn, one of the justices of the peace for Anne-Arundel county, by taking the oath prescribed by the constitution and form of government; and William Perry, Esquire, the president of the senate, not attending, the senate then proceeded to the election of another president, to act during his absence, and the ballot box being prepared, and the ballots deposited therein, on examination thereof it appeared, that Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Esquire, had a majority of votes; whereupon it is declared in the senate, that Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Esquire is duly elected president of the senate pro tempore.

Mr. Henry Warfield was appointed clerk, in the room of Mr. Ninian Pinkney, who resigned, and qualified as such by taking the oath of fidelity and support to this state, the oath of office, and subscribing a declaration of his belief in the Christian religion, and also by taking the oath to support the constitution of the United States.

The following message being prepared, was read and agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates, by the clerk.

WE have to inform you that a quorum of the senate is assembled, and that we are ready to proceed to the business of the session.
