W E D N E S D A Y, November 4, 1795.

Under this persuasion, we take the liberty of submitting to your consideration the propriety of constituting a joint committee of both houses to compare and examine all bills from time to time, during the session, as soon as they shall be severally engrossed; and we have appointed Robert Smith, Richard Sprigg, junior, and William Cooke, Esquires, a committee on the part of the senate to join such gentlemen as you may be pleased to nominate, in case you should accede to this proposition.
