

The bill, entitled, An act to establish a bank, and incorporate the subscribers thereto, with the amendments, was sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers to the clerk of the senate the bill, entitled, An act to lay out a turnpike road from the city of Washington to Baltimore-town, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, December 9, 1795: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, DECEMBER 12, 1795.

GENTLEMEN OF THE SENATE,

WE have been induced to negative your bill, entitled, An act to lay out a turnpike road from the city of Washington to Baltimore-town; our reasons for so doing are, that we are not in possession of sufficient information to direct our judgments on this occasion, and it is now too late in the session to acquire the same; that persons appear at the bar of the house who conceive themselves materially injured if the said bill should pass, and we are desirous the public should be informed of the object, provisions and intention, of said bill, by publication thereof in the news-papers of this state, during the recess of the legislature, before the next session of assembly, and it does not appear to this house that notice of application for this bill has been given.

Which was read.

The resolution in favour of Thomas Cockey Deye, was read the second time and dissented to.

The resolution in favour of Solomon Oldson, was read the second time and assented to.

The president communicates to the senate a letter from the agent of this state, assigning certain reasons for the want of time for not complying with the order of the senate; which was read.

The message from the house of delegates respecting the bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act directing the manner of suing out attachments in this province, and limiting the extent of them, was read the second time, and on motion, ORDERED, That the senate reconsider the amendments to said bill; which were accordingly reconsidered, and the amendment for striking out the proviso at the end of the bill was read and assented to.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

SUNDAY, December 13, 1795.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Richard Sprigg, junior, Esquire, who had leave of absence. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill, entitled, An act for laying out a road by Banker's mill, in Frederick county, was read the second time and will pass.

The bill, entitled, An act to revive and aid the proceedings of the orphans court of Calvert county, and to call and adjourn the same, was read the second time and will pass.

The bill, entitled, An additional supplementary act to the act, entitled, An act for the marking of highways, and making the heads of rivers, creeks, branches and swamps, passable for horse and foot, was read the second time and will pass with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed. In the 4th line, 1st page, strike out the word "authorising" and insert "authorise." 3d page, 7th and 8th lines, strike out the words "employ an able-bodied labourer in his stead to perform the several services of him required by this act," and insert "may pay to the overseers of the road the sum of three shillings and nine-pence current money per day for every day he shall be called upon to labour on the public roads, to be employed by him in procuring labourers to work upon the road, and it shall be the duty of the overseer annually to account with the levy court of his county for all sums of money which he shall receive in virtue of this act."

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act to streighten and amend the several public roads in several counties, and for other purposes therein mentioned, was read the second time by especial order and will pass.

The bill, entitled, An act to repeal part of the act of assembly therein mentioned, was read the second time by especial order and will not pass.

The bill, entitled, An act in favour of Samuel Turbutt Wright, of Queen-Anne's county, was read the second time and will not pass.

The bill, entitled, A further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to streighten and amend the public roads in Harford county, and for other purposes, was read the second time and will pass with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed. In the 5th line of the 2d page, strike out the word "three" and insert in lieu thereof "seven." Second page, 8th line, after the word "court" insert "if they shall approve of the same."

The bill, entitled, An act to lay out and open a public waggon road from Hughes's coaling ground, on the south mountain, to intersect the road, at or near Joseph Staley's, leading to Frederick-town, was read the second time and will pass.

The bill, entitled, An act to open a road from George-town to a bridge to be erected over the river Patowmack at or near the little falls, was read the second time and will pass with the proposed amendments.
