GENTLEMEN OF THE SENATE, UNDER an impression that the bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to esta-blish a bank in the district of Columbia, has been negatived because its possible tendency might be to increase the capital of the bank quicker than the original act contemplated, we therefore return it to you for reconsideration, suggesting, that if you will adopt the following amendment, to be inserted at the end of the third line of the second page, it will be agreeable to the house of delegates, to wit: "And provided also, that the aggregate amount of voluntary payments so made to the bank shall in no one year exceed the sum of one hundred thousand dollars." By the existing act of incorporation the directors of the bank have now power to call annually for payments to the above amount, and the penalty of forfeiture on non-payment tends extremely to depress the value of the stock of the bank.
