THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, December 22, 1797.

RESOLVED, That this state will loan, for the use of the city of Washington, the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, agreeably to the request made by the commissioners of the said city under the authority given by the prefident of the United States to them, conformably to the act of the congress of the United States.

RESOLVED, That the faid loan be paid in fix per cent. Rock of the United States bearing an immediate interest of fix per cent. at par, which sum the trustee of this state is authorised to transfer to the faid commissioners; provided, to secure the repayment of the same, with interest, at the times and in the manner prescribed by the act of congress, entitled, An act authorising a loan for the use of the city of Washington, in the district of Columbia, and for other purposes therein mentioned, Gustavus Scott, William Thornton and Alexander White, or a majority of them, give bond to the state of Maryland, conditioned for the payment of one hundred thousand dollars, and punctual payment of six per cent. interest on the said sum of one hundred thousand dollars quarterly, and on the several days on which interest on the said stock is now receivable from the United States; and provided also, that before the transfer of said stock Gustavus Scott, William Thornton and Alexander White, in their individual capacities, give bond to the state of Maryland, in the penalty of two hundred thousand dollars, conditioned for the repayment of the said sum of one hundred thousand dollars, with interest, at the times and in the mode prescribed by the act of congress aforesaid, as additional and collateral security for the same. The following message was prepared, read and agreed to.

By THE SENATE, DECEMBER 22, 1797.

GENTLEMEN,

THE facts stated in the resolution grounded upon the application of William Stoddert Bond, do not appear to be satisfactorily proved to the senate, we have therefore differed from it; but on account of the uncommon extent of the survey mentioned therein, of which we are satisfied, and in consideration of the large sum of money to become due thereon, we think that surther time may be reasonably allowed for returning the certificate, and for fecuring the composition thereon; and as there may be many other individuals interested in the return of certificates of large surveys, who may be greatly prejudiced without indulgence, it is submitted to your house, whether, in the case of surveys exceeding one thousand acres of land, it may not be adviseable to extend the time limitted by law for returning the certificates thereof, and to allow the parties to instal for the payment of the composition money. think this indulgence would be ultimately beneficial to the interest of the state, and thus thinking, we have taken the liberty to propose the resolution accompanying this message, which, if originated in your house, will meet with our concurrence.
