THE claim of Henry Harford against this state, upon which you propose a conference, is certainly an object of great magnitude, but we deem it only of fecondary importance compared to the other subjects mentioned in our message.

The communications from the executive of Pennsylvania respecting the Susquehanna navigation, and the canal from the Chesapeake to the Delaware, and the situation of our bank stock in England, appeared to us in a peculiar degree to demand a conference, that the joint information of the two houses might be freely interchanged.
