We have appointed Charles Golfborough, junior, and William Hemsley, junior, Esquires, to join the gentlemen named by you in the examination of the ballots. No person is nominated by this house in addition to the gentleman named by you.

By order, W. S. GREEN, clk, The senate having qualified agreeably to the constitution and form of government, proceeded to the election of a governor; the ballot box being prepared, the ballots were deposited therein, sealed up, and delivered to the committee of the fenate appointed to meet the committee of the house of delegates, who retired to the conference room, and after the examination of the ballots returned and reported, that his excellency Benjamin Ogle, Esquire, is unanimously elected.

Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that his excellency Benjamin Ogle, Esquire, is unanimously elected

governor of the state of Maryland.
