The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following message:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, NOVEMBER 12, 1801.

GENTLEMEN OF THE SENATE,

WE have received your message, and the communication from James Houston, Esquire, who is withdrawn from the nomination. We propose going immediately into a second ballot for a senator to the United States. Robert Wright and William Winder, Esquires, are nominated by us, and the gentlemen named by us in the former message will join the gentlemen appointed by you to examine the ballots.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

BY THE SENATE, NOVEMBER 12, 1801.

GENTLEMEN OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES,

WE have received your message, and are ready to proceed immediately to the election of a senator to the United States. No person is nominated by the senate in addition to those named by you.

The senate then proceeded to ballot a second time for a senator from the eastern shore, to represent this state in the senate of the United States; the ballot box being prepared, the ballots were deposited therein, sealed up, and delivered to the committee of the senate appointed to join the committee of the house of delegates, who retired to the conference room, and after examining the ballots, returned and reported, that Robert Wright had sixty votes and William Winder twenty-six votes.

Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that Robert Wright is duly elected a senator to represent this state in the senate of the United States.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

F R I D A Y, November 13, 1801.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The resolution in favour of Charles Baltzell was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act to open a road from John and Isaac Hearn's mill, in Worcester county, to intersect the main road leading from Salisbury to Blackfoot, and the bill, entitled, An act for changing part of the divisional road between Somerset and Worcester counties, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the Roman catholic congregation worshipping at Saint-Joseph's church, in Saint-Mary's county, was read the second time and will pass with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed. In the 13th line of the first section strike out the words "or devise." In the 16th line of the same section strike out the words "or bequest."

Sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to appoint commissioners to sell and dispose of certain lands belonging to Stepney parish, in Somerset county, and to apply the money arising from the sales thereof, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, November 9, 1801:

The president communicates to the senate a letter from his excellency the governor, informing the legislature of the death of Esme Baily, late register of wills for Somerset county; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act to streighten and amend the several public roads in several counties, and for other purposes therein mentioned, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates, November 11, 1801: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.
