The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Henry Troup, was read the second time and will not pass.

The bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to provide for the appointment of commissioners for the regulation and improvement of Cambridge, in Dorchester county, and to establish and regulate a market in said town, was read the second time and will pass with the proposed amendments.
