BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, NOVEMBER 6, 1802.

GENTLEMEN OF THE SENATE,

Davis, a committee on the part of this house to join such gentlemen as you may nominate, to form a committee of both houses to compare and examine all bills from time to time during the session, as soon as they shall be severally engrossed.

The senate adjourns until Monday morning 10 o'clock.

M O N D A Y, November 8, 1802.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings from the first day of November to this day inclusive were read. Messieurs James Brown, Henry Hollingsworth and John Worthington, appeared in the senate, and qualified before Allen Quynn, Esquire, one of the justices of the peace for Anne-Arundel county, agreeably to the constitution and form of government of this state.

The president laid before the senate a letter from the executive of this state, communicating an account of their proceedings since the last session of the general assembly; which was read, and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of John Erskine, of Talbot county; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The president communicates to the senate a letter from Mr. William Smith, resigning his seat in the senate which was read and accepted by the senate.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

GENTLEMEN OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES,

WE have received your message of the sixth instant, and have appointed Mr. Hayward, Mr. McCulloch and Mr. Mackall, a committee on the part of the senate to join the gentlemen by you appointed to compare and examine the engrossed bills.

On motion, ORDERED, That on Wednesday next the senate will proceed to the election of members to fill the vacancies in the senate.

The president laid before the senate a letter from John Callahan of the 4th instant, enclosing an account of taxes received in his office for one year, ending on the second day of last month; which was read, and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

A petition from Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, praying that a law may pass, authorising the register of the land-office to receive a duplicate certificate of a certain tract of land, and enter the same on record, was referred, read, and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

GENTLEMEN OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES,

THIS being the day appointed by the constitution and form of government for the election of a governor, we propose to go into the choice of a governor immediately, and have appointed Mr. Brown and Mr. Johnson to join the members named by your house in the examination of the ballot boxes. John Francis Mercer, Esquire is put in nomination by this house.

Mr. Samuel Ringgold appeared in the senate, and qualified before Allen Quynn, Esquire, one of the justices of the peace for Anne-Arundel county, agreeably to the constitution and form of government of this state.

On motion, the question was put, That the senate reconsider the reference of the petition of Charles Carroll of Carrollton, to the consideration of the house of delegates? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion, ORDERED, That the said petition be referred to Mr. McCulloch, Mr. Houston and Mr. Johnson to consider and report thereon.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act relative to the continuance of causes in the court of appeals, and to alter the time of holding the same, thus endorsed; "By the house of delegates November 8, 1802: Read the first and second time by especial order and will pass.
