

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER SESSION, 1802.

W E D N E S D A Y, November 17, 1802.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Mackall. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act for draining part of a branch called The Unicorn branch, lying in the upper part of Queen-Anne's county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

On motion, ORDERED, That the letter from the executive of this state, and the letter from the agent for the recovery of the bank stock, be referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The president laid before the senate a report from the trustees of Frederick county academy, containing an account of the present state of said academy; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The following resolution was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

BY THE SENATE, NOVEMBER 17, 1802.

RESOLVED, That a senator to represent this state in the senate of the United States, who shall be a resident of the western shore of the state of Maryland, be elected by ballot, and the person having a majority of the ballots of all the attending members of both houses of the legislature, be declared duly elected to represent this state in the senate of the United States after the third day of March next; and that a commission issue to the said senator appointed as aforesaid, signed by the governor for the time being, or in his absence by the presiding member of the council, in the following words, to wit: The State of Maryland to — —, Greeting: The General Assembly of Maryland, reposing especial confidence in your integrity and abilities, have appointed you senator to represent
