

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER SESSION, 1802.

F R I D A Y, November 19, 1802.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The bill, entitled, An act to lay out and open a road from the main road leading from the head of Chester to the head of Sassafraz, in Kent county, to the Delaware line, and the bill, entitled, An act further extending the time for making returns of certain certificates and plots, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Mr. Worthington has leave of absence for a few days.

The following resolution was read, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

BY THE SENATE, NOVEMBER 19, 1802.

Whereas it appears by the reports made to this general assembly by the treasurer and the auditor-general of this state, that considerable sums of money are due to the state under the several denominations of debts therein mentioned: And whereas some of the debts appear to have been long due, and the said reports are not sufficiently explicit and satisfactory to determine what is the real and existing situation of the funds of this state; therefore **RESOLVED**, That Mr. Brown, Mr. McCulloch and Mr. Ringgold, be a committee on the part of this house, to join such members as may be appointed by the house of delegates, to inquire into the same, and that they be authorised to call on the treasurer and auditor for all such explanations as they shall think proper, and report the existing situation of the public funds and revenue, and also to consider and report such measures as may be necessary for the increase and improvement thereof.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, NOVEMBER 19, 1802.

RESOLVED, That all proceedings against James Boarman, and others, for the recovery of the balance due by him to the state of Maryland, be and they are hereby suspended until after the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and three, and that the said James Boarman be and he is hereby indulged in the payment of the said balance till the period before mentioned; provided that the judgment aforesaid shall continue and be in full force, notwithstanding the suspension of proceedings directed by this resolution, and if the balance that will then be due on the aforesaid judgment be not paid by the time aforesaid, an execution may again be issued against the said James Boarman to enforce the payment thereof.
