RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby required to pay to Henry Dukehart, of the city of Baltimore, or his order, seventy pounds, being the amount of the valuation of a slave named John, the property of the said Henry Dukehart, which said slave was convicted of arson in the criminal court of Baltimore county, and the sentence was commuted into banishment without the United States.

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby authorised and required to pay to James Wilson, Esquire, sheriff of Baltimore county, the sum of one hundred and ninety-two dollars, being the amount of his expenditures incurred in pursuing certain offenders into the state of Virginia, who had carried off sundry Malay Indians from the city of Baltimore, with intent to sell them as slaves.

M O N D A Y, January 10, 1803.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The resolution relative to the government-house was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution in favour of Henry Dukehart was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution in favour of James Williams was read the second time, dissented from, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, was read the second time by a special order, passed with the proposed amendments, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Amendments proposed. 1. After the word "Annapolis" in the 2d line of the preamble insert "William Finn." 2. After the word "Smith" in the 4th line of the enacting clause insert "William Finn."

On motion, the question was put, That the senate reconsider the bill, entitled, An act granting a loan of money to the trustees of Charlotte-Hall school? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:

So it was resolved in the affirmative.

The resolution rescinding the resolution in favour of John Sterrett, and others, was read the second time, dissented from, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The senate proceeded to the reconsideration of the bill, entitled, An act granting a loan of money to the trustees of Charlotte-Hall school, and on motion, the following was proposed and received as an amendment to said bill, to wit: "Provided always, and be it enacted, that in addition to the security aforesaid, and before the
