BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, NOVEMBER 22, 1804.
RESOLVED unanimously, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby directed and required to pay unto Henry Gassaway, of the county of Anne-Arundel, late a lieutenant in the revolutionary war, a sum of money equal to half pay as lieutenant, annually, in quarterly payments, during his life, as a reward to those meritorious services which he rendered his country in establishing her liberty and independence.
