On motion, the question was put, That the senate postpone the order of the day until Tuesday the eighteenth instant? Resolved in the affirmative.

The bill, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act respecting the settlers on the reserved lands westward of Fort Cumberland, was read the second time and will not pass.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

**T**HE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. William Whitely appeared in the senate, and after taking the oaths required by the constitution and form of government of this state, and subscribing a declaration of his belief in the christian religion, and taking the oath for the support of the government of the United States, took his seat.

BY THE SENATE, DECEMBER 12, 1804.

GENTLEMEN OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES,

WE agree, in conformity with your message of this day, to proceed immediately to the election of a person to be recommended as register of wills for Allegany county. Mr. Thomas Johnson being absent, who was named in our message of the 7th instant to count the ballots, we have named Mr. Partridge, who, with Mr. Thomas, will join the gentlemen named in your message in examining the ballots.

The senate proceeded to ballot for a person to be recommended to the governor to be commissioned as register of wills for Allegany county; the ballots were deposited in the ballot box, sealed up, and delivered to the committee of the senate appointed to meet the committee of the house of delegates, who retired to the conference room, and after examining the ballots returned and reported, that George Bruce had forty-seven votes, and Hanson Briscoe had thirty-two votes.

Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that George Bruce, having had a majority of the votes of all the attending members of both houses in his favour, be recommended to the governor to be commissioned as register of wills for Allegany county.

The resolution in favour of John Norris, of John, of Harford county, was read the second time and assented to with the proposed amendments.

Amendments proposed. 1. Before the word "resolved" in the first line insert "Whereas John Norris, of John, of Harford county, by his petition to this general assembly, hath set forth, that a certain David M'Cray had purchased from Daniel of St. Thomas Jenifer, late intendant, a tract of land in Harford county; which said David M'Cray assigned his interest therein to a certain George Rampley, who assigned the same to a certain George M'Cormick, who being so entitled, and holding the said assignments, delivered the same to David Glark, surveyor of said county, for the purpose of making a survey of the said land; that a survey was made thereof by the said surveyor in the name of the said George M'Cormick, which said surveyor made a certificate thereof, wherein this land was called M'Cormick's Frolick, which certificate was returned to the land-office, and is now remaining there; and that the said George M'Cormick, afterwards, for a valuable consideration, assigned his interest in said certificate to him the said John Norris; that the said two above-mentioned
