Which was read.

The bill, entitled, A further supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the better regulation of apprentices, was read the second time and will not pass. Sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of the corporation of the Roman catholic clergymen, and for other purposes, was read the second time, passed with the proposed amendment, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Amendment proposed. Strike out from the word "writing" in the last line of the bill to the end thereof.

The senate adjourns until Monday morning 9 o'clock.

M O N D A Y, January 6, 1806.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday, except Mr. Harwood, president, and Mr. T. Johnson. The president being absent, the senate proceeded to ballot for a president pro tempore, and on examination of the ballots it appeared, that Mr. John Partridge was elected. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The bill, entitled, An act to alter and change the name of Elizabeth Sower, of the city of Baltimore, to that of Elizabeth Lammott, was read the second time and will not pass.

The resolution in favour of Patrick Murdock, of Allegany county, was read the second time and dissented from.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to provide for the organization and regulation of the courts of common law in this state, and for the administration of justice therein, a bill, entitled, An act for the support of Covinton Jones and wife, a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the drawing of a lottery within the city of Baltimore for the purpose therein mentioned, severally passed by that house January 4, 1806; a bill, entitled, An act to lay out and make a public road in Frederick county, and a bill, entitled, An act to provide for recording certain papers in the register's office of Dorchester county, severally passed by that house January 6, 1806; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to lay out and open a certain road in Baltimore county to intersect the main road leading from Cromwell's bridge to Baltimore, a bill, entitled, An act to authorise Baltimore county court to remove the case therein mentioned, a bill, entitled, An act authorising James Rice and Mary Wolf to dispose of the land therein mentioned, severally passed by that house January 6, 1806; and the following resolution:

By the HOUSE of DELEGATES, January 6, 1806.

RESOLVED, That the right of the state of Maryland in and to a tract or parcel of land, lying in Allegany county, called Workman's Fortune, and patented to Jacob Workman on the fifth day of September, eighteen hundred and five, shall be and the same is hereby relinquished to said Jacob Workman, on condition of his paying into the treasury of the western shore the sum of six pounds five shillings on or before the first day of February next.

The resolution in favour of Marsham Parker was read the second time and dissented from.

T U E S D A Y, January 7, 1806.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. Harwood, president, appeared in the senate.

On motion, ORDERED, That the order for the second reading of the bill, entitled, An act to withdraw the funds from Washington and Saint-John's colleges, and subject the same to the appropriation of the legislature, be postponed until Friday next the tenth instant.

The bill, entitled, An act to reduce into one the several acts of assembly respecting elections, and to regulate said elections, was read the second time and will pass.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.
