

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER SESSION, 1806. 11

S A T U R D A Y, November 22, 1806.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The president laid before the senate letters from Mr. William Smithson, Mr. Richard Ridgely and Mr. James Brown, the first of whom accepted, and the two last declined accepting, their appointments as senators; which were read.

The senate, pursuant to their resolution, proceeded to ballot for a director on the part of the state of the Bank of Baltimore; the ballots being deposited in the ballot box, on examination thereof it appeared, that John M'Kim, junior, was unanimously elected.

Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that John M'Kim, junior, is unanimously elected by the senate on the part of the state a director of the Bank of Baltimore for and during the term prescribed by law.

The president laid before the senate the report of Richard Potts, chairman of the visitors of Frederick county school; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

On motion, **RESOLVED**, That the senate will proceed, on Tuesday next, to fill up the vacancies in the senate, occasioned by the non-acceptance of Richard Ridgely, on the western shore, and James Brown, on the eastern shore.

The senate adjourns until Monday morning 9 o'clock.

M O N D A Y, November 24, 1806.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday, except Mr. M'Elderry. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to authorise and empower the levy court of Worcester county to assess and levy a sum of money for the support and maintenance of Susanna Davis, passed by that house November 24, 1806; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

T U E S D A Y, November 25, 1806.

THE senate met: Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. M'Elderry appeared in the senate.

The senate, pursuant to their resolution, proceeded to the election of a member to fill the vacancy occasioned by the non-acceptance of Mr. Richard Ridgely, and after qualifying according to the constitution and form of government, the ballot box being prepared, and the ballots deposited therein, on examination thereof it appeared, that Elias Glenn had a majority of votes.

Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that Elias Glenn, having had a majority of votes, is duly elected a member of the senate.

The senate, pursuant to their resolution, proceeded to the election of a member to fill the vacancy occasioned by the non-acceptance of Mr. James Brown, and after qualifying according to the constitution and form of government, the ballot box being prepared, and the ballots deposited therein, on examination thereof it appeared, that Stephen Lowrey had a majority of votes.

Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that Stephen Lowrey, having had a majority of votes, is duly elected a member of the senate.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following message:

By the H O U S E of D E L E G A T E S, November 25, 1806.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

WE propose, with the concurrence of your house, to proceed immediately to the election of a senator in the senate of the United States. Philip Reid, William Hayward and John Partridge, Esquires, are put in nomination by this house. We have appointed Mr. Smoot and Mr. Philip Stuart, on the part of this house, to join such gentlemen as may be named by your house, for the purpose of counting the ballots.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

By the S E N A T E, November 25, 1806.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

WE are prepared to proceed immediately to the election of a senator of the United States, and are authorised to state, that John Partridge, Esquire, nominated in your message, requests his name to be withdrawn. No person is put in nomination by this house in addition to those named by you. We have appointed Mr. Dorsey and Mr. Gibson to join the gentlemen named by you to examine the ballots.
