The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to provide for recording certain papers in the register's office of Saint-Mary's county, passed by that house December 2, 1806; and the following message:

*Gentlemen of the Senate,*

WE propose, with the concurrence of your body, on Saturday, the 13th instant, to go into a joint ballot for the election of a senator to represent this state in the senate of the United States after the third day of March next.

By the HOUSE of DELEGATES, December 2, 1806.

RESOLVED, That the governor and council be and they are hereby empowered to order such repairs to be made in the senate chamber, and in the room occupied by the house of delegates, as to them shall appear necessary; and the treasurer of the western shore is hereby directed to pay the amount of such bills as shall be approved of by the governor and council, out of any unappropriated money remaining in the treasury.

A memorial from Samuel Chase was preferred, read, and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act to regulate the inspection of tobacco, a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of George Washington Sykes, of Calvert county, severally passed by that house December 2, 1806; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

By the SENATE, December 3, 1806.

*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,*

WE have to perform the melancholy duty of informing you of the decease of Mr. Thomas Duckett, a member of the senate. As a mark of respect to his memory, we propose that the members of the two branches of the legislature convene in the senate chamber, this day at 3 o'clock, for the purpose of joining in procession at his funeral, and that each member of the legislature, and the officers thereof, wear a band and scarf during the remainder of the session.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

By the SENATE, December 3, 1806.

*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,*

WE have received your message of yesterday, proposing Saturday, the 13th instant, as the day for the two houses to go into a joint ballot for the election of a senator of the United States for six years from the 3d day of March next. We can see no possible advantage to the state by putting off the appointment to so distant a day, when we anticipate rising on the 15th instant, and therefore propose Friday next as the day for the election, provided it meets the concurrence of your body; and for the regulation of the said election have framed the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That Friday, the 5th instant, be appointed to choose a senator in the senate of the United States from the 3d day of March next, who shall be a resident of the eastern shore of the state of Maryland, and that the person having a majority of the ballots of all the attending members of both houses of the legislature be declared duly elected to represent this state in the senate of the United States; and that a commission issue to the said senator, appointed as aforesaid, signed by the governor for the time being, or in his absence by the presiding member of the council, in the following words, to wit: To ——. The legislature of Maryland, reposing especial confidence in your integrity and abilities, have appointed you senator, to represent this state in the senate of the United States from the 3d day of March next until the 4th day of March, eighteen hundred and thirteen. Given under my hand, and the seal of this state, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and —, and in the — year of the independence of America.
