The bill, entitled, An act to lay out and open a road near the Three Bridges, in Caroline county, was read

the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk. The clerk of the house of delegates, delivers a bill, entitled, An act to alter, change and amend, a road in Anne-Arundel county, a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of the representatives of George Sharky, of Washington county, severally passed by that house December 20, 1806; a bill, entitled, An act to enable the trustess of the Roman catholic church in the city of Baltimore to purchase a piece of ground therein mentioned, a bill, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act for erecting a village at Choptank Bridge, in Caroline county, and for other purposes therein mentioned, severally passed by that house December 22, 1806; and the following resolutions:

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby authorised to pay out of any unappropriated money in the treasury, to the holders and possessors of the said bills of exchange or certificates issued by the treasurer of the western shore, as commissioner, by virtue of the aforesaid act of assembly, the amount of the said bills of exchange or certificates by them respectively held and possessed, together with interest thereon from the respective dates of such bills of exchange and certificates, and the costs of protest, and

the treasurer is hereby directed to pay the bills, interests and costs, at the par of exchange.

the following report THE committee to whom was referred the petition of Griffith Evans and Thorowgood Smith, beg leave to report, that they have taken the same under their consideration, and are of opinion that very considerable difficulty, will arise in assessing the damages which may be sustained by individuals whose property will be affected by the passage of the law therein prayed for, and also that doubts are seriously entertained by the committee, which the damages which may be sustained by individuals ought rightly to be paid out of the funds of the city, in its corporate capacity, or out of the pockets of individuals whose property may be contiguous thereto.
