Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that Leonard Covington is unanimously elected a member of the senate.

The bill, entitled, An act authorising Thomas J. Pattison, sheriff and collector of Dorchester county, to complete his collection, was read the second time, passed with the proposed amendments, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief and benefit of the poor, and trustees of the poor, of Washington county, passed by that house November 13, 1807; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Glenn, from the committee appointed on the petition of Richardson Stuart, and others, delivers a bill, entitled, An act for removing an obstruction in Conewago street, and for extending the width and changing the direction of Ten Feet Lane in the city of Baltimore; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act authorising Joseph Green, late sheriff and collector of Charles county, to complete his collection, passed by that house November 13, 1807; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.
