

every of the landholders over whose land the said road is or may be contemplated to pass or run, shall have signified in writing to the levy court of said county their assent thereto."

The bill, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act to regulate elections, was read the second time and will pass with the proposed amendment.

Amendment proposed. After the word "that" in the 1st line of the 1st enacting clause insert "Barton Tabbs, Edward Mattingly."

The senate, pursuant to their resolution, proceeded to the election of two directors on the part of this state in the Union Bank of Maryland; the ballots being deposited in the ballot box, on examination thereof it appeared, that Samuel Wright had forty-seven votes, Thomas Dickson thirty-eight votes, Samuel Briscoe thirty-four votes, John W. Glenn twenty votes, Samuel Howard eleven votes, Alexander Rogers eight votes, Samuel Griffith six votes, Peter Forney three votes, and John Howard one vote. Samuel Wright only having had a majority of the votes of all the attending members of both branches of the legislature, the senate proceeded to a second ballot, when it appeared that Thomas Dickson had forty-eight votes, and Samuel Briscoe thirty-five votes.

Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that Samuel Wright and Thomas Dickson, having had a majority of the votes of all the attending members of both branches of the legislature, are duly elected directors on the part of this state in the Union Bank of Maryland, for and during the term prescribed by law.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The bill, entitled, A supplement to an act to appoint and authorise commissioners to review and lay out a part of the road therein mentioned in Harford county, and the bill, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act to regulate elections, were sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to establish a bank, and incorporate the subscribers thereto, passed by that house December 3, 1807. Ordered that the said bill be engrossed.

On motion, the question was put, Will the senate reconsider the bill, entitled, An act annulling the marriage of Britania Marshall, of Dorchester county? Resolved in the affirmative.

The bill being read, the question was put, Shall this bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Robert Leatherbury, late sheriff of Somerset county, was read the second time and will not pass. Sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Glenn. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

On the second reading of the bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Mary Gwinn, of Frederick county, the question was put, Will the senate receive the following as an amendment thereto? to wit:

Strike out from the word "living" in the 2d line of the 2d page to the end of the preamble.
