The resolution in favour of Denwood Hicks and William Ennalls, was read the second time and assented to, with the proposed amendment.

Amendment proposed. Strike out the figures "1810" at the end of the resolution and insert "eighteen hundred and nine."

The resolution in favour of John C. Bond was read the second time and assented to.

The resolution in favour of Jeremiah T. Chase was read the second time and dissented from.

The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

SATURDAY, January 2, 1808.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. Partridge appeared in the senate.

The bill, entitled, An act to encourage the destruction of crows in the several counties therein mentioned, the bill, entitled, An act to prevent the going at large of swine and poultry in Clarksburgh, in Montgomery county, the resolution in favour of Archibald Gordon, the resolution in favour of Thomas Jackson, the resolution in favour of Denwood Hicks and William Ennalls, the resolution in favour of John C. Bond, and the resolution in favour of Jeremiah T. Chase, were sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

A petition from the devisees of doctor Henry Schuebly, praying a law to vest in them a fee simple estate, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Mason, Mr. Partridge and Mr. Somervell, to consider and report thereon.

On motion, ORDERED, That the committee appointed on the petition of Thomas Deye Cockey and Joshua Frederick Cockey, be discharged from the further consideration thereof.

The resolution was then read the second time and dissented from.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to vacate a certain certificate therein mentioned, a bill, entitled, A further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to alter the mode of collecting the county tax in Harford county, a bill, entitled, An act authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money for the vestry of St. John's parish, in Harford and Baltimore counties, and a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Notley Maddox, sheriff of Prince-George's county, severally passed by that house January 2, 1808; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of the heirs of Levin Woolford, of Dorchester county, a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Martin Brown, an insolvent debtor, of St. Mary's county, severally passed by that house January 2, 1808; the following resolution:
