

The bill, entitled, An act to release to Richard Trimble the right of the state of Maryland to the property therein mentioned, and the bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the contributors to the Baltimore General Dispensary, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act to vacate a certain certificate therein mentioned, was read the second time, passed with the proposed amendments, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

Amendments proposed. 1. Strike out from the word "certificate" in the last line of 1st page to the end of the preamble, and insert "and the land therein mentioned be re-vested in the state of Maryland." 2. Strike out from the word "hereby" in the 7th line of the 2d page to the end of the bill, and insert "and the lands therein and thereby included, be and the same are hereby re-vested in the state of Maryland; and that the said land, or any part thereof, shall not be liable to be taken up, acquired or affected, by any person whatever, in virtue of any species of warrant whatever, until the legislature of Maryland shall hereafter make provision for disposing of the same."

The resolution in favour of John Boudy was read the second time and dissented from.

On motion, the question was put, Will the senate reconsider the resolution in favour of John Lynch? Determined in the negative.

The following resolution was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

By the S E N A T E, January 9, 1808.

RESOLVED, That from and after the present session of assembly, no private act shall pass the legislature upon any petition or application whatever, unless notice is given by the petitioners, or applicants, in some newspaper printed in the city of Baltimore, for — successive weeks, and by advertising at the court-house door of the county where such petitioners or applicants reside, at least — weeks before the meeting of the general assembly to which such application is to be made, that a petition is intended to be preferred, mentioning in such notice the substance of such petition; and that evidence of the notice be produced upon hearing such petition.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read. Mr. Gibson and Mr. Whitely appeared in the senate.

The bill, entitled, An act to authorise the levy court of Anne-Arundel county to assess and levy a sum of money for the purposes therein mentioned, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act for amending, and reducing into system, the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, the duties of executors, administrators and guardians; and the rights of orphans and other representatives of deceased persons, a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act authorising a lottery for raising a sum of money for repairing Saint-George's church on Deer Creek, in Harford county, a bill, entitled, An act to lay out and open a straight road from Forgusson Smith's to Marley mills, in Cæcil county, a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Jonathan Edwards and Gilbert Middleton, of the city of Baltimore, a bill, entitled, An act to correct a mistake in the beginning of lot number twenty-two in the town of Vienna, in Dorchester county, a bill, entitled, An act relative to writs of capias ad satisfaciendum, a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the benefit of Margaretta Chalmers, and a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate the Charitable Marine Society of Baltimore, severally passed by that house January 9, 1808; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion, ORDERED, That the second reading of the bill, entitled, An act to regulate and discipline the militia of this state, be postponed until to-morrow.
