F R I D A Y, November 18, 1808.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. Glenn, from the committee, delivers a bill, entitled, An act to repeal an act, entitled, An act for the punishment of forgery, and for other purposes; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. The senate adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

S A T U R D A Y, November 19, 1808.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. On motion, ORDERED, That the bill, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, passed at November session, eighteen hundred and five, have a second reading on Wednesday next.

The senate adjourns until Monday morning 9 o'clock.

M O N D A Y, November 21, 1808.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday, except Mr. Glenn. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the trustees of the male free-school of Baltimore, passed by that house November 21, 1808; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

By the S E N A T E, November 21, 1808.

*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,*

AS the constitutional term for which one of the senators elected to represent this state in the senate of the United States, will expire before the next annual meeting of the legislature of Maryland, and as it is important that this state should be at all times fully represented in the legislature of the United States, we propose, on Thursday next, with the concurrence of your house, to go into a joint ballot for the election of a senator to represent this state in the senate of the United States after the third day of March next.

A memorial from the president and directors of the Union Manufacturing Company of Maryland, praying an act of incorporation, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. M'Elderry, Mr. Glenn and Mr. T. B. Dorsey, to consider and report thereon.

A petition from Richard Harden, of Baltimore county, praying for a special act of insolvency, was preferred, and referred to Mr. T. B. Dorsey, Mr. M'Elderry and Mr. Glenn, to consider and report thereon.
