Amendments proposed. 1. Strike out the preamble. 2. After the word "empowered" in the 2d line of the enacting clause insert "if in their discretion they shall deem the same right and proper." 3. Strike out the words "and directed" in the 3d line of the enacting crause.

The following resolutions were read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Whereas various representations, in the shape of petitions and protests, have been recently made to the executive and legislative authorities of the general government, from sundry sections of the union, purporting to express the sentiments of the citizens of this country upon the policy and operation of the existing embargo laws: And whereas the multiform tenor of those representations manifest the existence of opposite and contradictory opinions upon this momentous subject: And whereas the citizens of the state of Maryland have, by their recent election of functionaries to the general government, unequivocally demonstrated their conviction of the wisdom and policy of those measures: And whereas it has been the usage of those who have represented the people of Maryland in their state legislature, faithfully to respond the fair expression of the public will upon great and important questions of national concern; therefore, RESOLVED, That the people of the state of Maryland, through the medium of their late elections, have evinced their approbation of the act laying an embargo and the several acts supplementary thereto.

RESOLVED. That no change or modification of the orders and decrees of the belligerent powers of Europe, favourable to the commerce of the United States, having occurred, the president has faithfully discharged the duties of his office in refusing to repeal the embargo laws, under the powers vested in him by an act of congress

of the twenty-fifth of April last.

RESOLVED. That the people of the state of Maryland, in their late election of electors, have exhibited undeniable proof of their high confidence in the present administration of the general government, and of their willingness to submit the present interests and nuture destines of the United States to their wisdom and virtue.
