

Edward Lloyd, the governor elect, attending in the senate room, ORDERED, That Mr. Thomas B. Deane and Mr. Bowie inform the house of delegates that Edward Lloyd, the governor elect, is attending in the senate room to qualify as governor of the state of Maryland, and request their attendance.

The speaker, attended by the members of the house of delegates, appeared in the senate room, and Edward Lloyd qualified as governor before the president of the senate, in the presence of both houses, by taking oaths directed by the constitution and form of government, the oath of office prescribed by law, and by taking an oath to support the constitution of the United States, and also by subscribing a declaration of his belief in the Christian religion.

The clerk of the house of delegates returns the bill, entitled, An act to alter the thirty-second article of the constitution and form of government, endorsed, "By the house of delegates, June 9, 1809: Read the second time and will pass with the proposed amendments."

Amendments proposed. After the word "second" in the title of the bill insert "and thirty-seventh." Strike out the word "article" in the title of the bill and insert "articles." Strike out the words "in the same manner" in the 8th line of the 1st page and insert "act." After the word "directed" in the 11th line of the same page insert "And be it enacted, That hereafter no governor shall be capable of holding any other office of profit during the time for which he shall be elected." After the word "second" in the 12th line of the same page insert "and thirty-seventh." Strike out the word "article" in the same line and insert "articles."

Also the following resolutions:

By the HOUSE of DELEGATES, June 8, 1809.

RESOLVED, That Captain James Clemson, under the direction of the executive of the state, cause to be mounted an iron field-piece belonging to the state, now lying at Liberty-town, in Frederick county, and when mounted, and completed with all the necessary apparatus, the executive to loan the same, as the property of the state, to the company of artillerists commanded by Capt. James Clemson, on the usual conditions, and to draw on the treasurer of the western shore for the amount of the expense attending the same.

By the HOUSE of DELEGATES, June 9, 1809.

RESOLVED, That the register of the land-office of the western shore be and he is hereby authorised and directed to grant to Samuel Brown a warrant for twelve hundred and eighty-six acres of land in Allegany county, upon the said Samuel Brown paying to the said register the fees of office for the same.

On motion, the question was put, Will the senate reconsider the bill, entitled, An act for the preservation and distribution of the vaccine matter for the use of the citizens of this state? Resolved in the affirmative.

The bill being read, the question was put, Shall this bill pass? Determined in the negative.

The following message was read and agreed to.

POST MERIDIEM, FOUR O'CLOCK.

THE senate met.

The bill, entitled, An act for the preservation and distribution of the vaccine matter for the use of the citizens of this state, with the message relative thereto, and the resolutions relative to repairing the armory at Frederick-town and at Easton, were sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution relative to mounting a field-piece in Frederick-town, and the resolution relative to the post-tentary, were severally read the second time by especial order, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution in favour of Frederick Green, and the resolution in favour of Samuel Brown, were severally read the second time by especial order, dissented from, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The amendments to the bill, entitled, An act to alter the thirty-second article of the constitution and form of government, were severally read the second time and assented to. Ordered that the said bill be engrossed.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the levy court of Washington county to levy a sum of money for the purposes therein mentioned, and a bill, entitled, A further additional supplementary act to an act, entitled, An act for regulating the mode of staying executions, and repealing the acts of assembly therein mentioned, severally passed by that house June 9, 1809; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table. Also the engrossed bills from No. 1 to No. 14, inclusive, were severally assented to by that house June 9, 1809; which were severally read, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.
