

port of that determination, because it will be seen, if the proposition be not too evidently fallacious to require an answer, that no new business is introduced, which has not been obviated and already completely answered in the course of the address to you on the 8th inst.

If the proposition offered to the immediate representatives of the people, by the legislature on a question of great moment to our constituents, had not been so completely rejected, we had entertained a fond expectation that a fair and honourable adjustment might have been effected; with increased pain and astonishment we perceive, that the senate have again rejected all hopes of doing without any other assurance whatever, at once subjecting themselves entirely to the dominion of the house of delegates.

The repeated and liberal advances on our part having thus failed, nothing remains for us but to leave an honourable body to their own responsibility; and under these circumstances, having transacted the business before us, the house of delegates have no option left but to comply with the desire expressed to close the present extraordinary session of the legislature.

We have appointed Mr. Sanders and Mr. Wilson to join the gentlemen named on the part of the senate to wait on his excellency the governor and request his attendance in the senate chamber to sign and seal the laws.

His excellency the governor attending in the senate room, ORDERED, That Mr. Thomas B. Dextey and Mr. Williams, wait upon the house of delegates, and inform them his excellency is attending in the senate room for the purpose of signing and sealing the engrossed bills.

The speaker, attended by the members of the house of delegates, appeared in the senate room, and following engrossed bills were presented by the speaker to his excellency the governor, who signed and sealed the same in the presence of both houses.

No. 1. An act for the relief of Dennis Connell, of Charles county.

No. 2. An act to confirm the location of the turnpike roads therein mentioned.

No. 3. A Further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to extend Centre-street in the northern part of the city of Baltimore, and to build a bridge therein across Jones Falls.

No. 4. An act to authorize and empower William Stansbury, and Ellen Kent Stansbury his wife, to purchase and lease the piece of ground therein mentioned.

No. 5. An act to prescribe the time which jurors shall serve in Baltimore county.

No. 6. An act to lay out a road therein mentioned.

No. 7. An act for the relief of Jacob Gettig, an insolvent debtor.

No. 8. An act for the benefit of Elizabeth Thomas, of Kent county.

No. 9. An act authorising and directing the levy court of Somerset county to levy a sum of money for the support and maintenance of Levin Miles, a lunatic.

No. 10. An act for the benefit of Edward Eversfield, a minor, and others, of Prince-George's county.

No. 11. An act for the relief of David C. Stewart, Lloyd Buchanan and William P. Stewart, of Baltimore county, insolvent debtors.

No. 12. An act annulling the marriage of Charles Farrow, and Anne his wife.

No. 13. An additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act to authorize a lottery to raise a sum of money for the repairs of Shrewsbury church, in Kent county.

No. 14. An act to authorize the governor and directors of the Susquehanna canal company to raise a sum of money by lottery for the purpose therein mentioned.

No. 15. A further additional supplementary act to an act, entitled, An act for regulating the mode of executing, and repealing the acts of assembly therein mentioned.

No. 16. An act to alter the thirty-second and thirty-seventh articles of the constitution and form of government.

No. 17. An act for the payment of the journal of accounts.

The senate adjourns until the first Monday in November next.

So ends the fourth session of the seventh senate, this tenth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and nine.
