

W E D N E S D A Y, November 8, 1809.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Whitely, who is indisposed. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Glenn appeared in the senate, and after taking the oaths required by the constitution and form of government, and subscribing a declaration of his belief in the Christian religion, and taking the oath for the support of the government of the United States, took his seat.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to settle and ascertain the salary of the members of the council for the ensuing year, passed by that house November 8th, 1809; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

A petition from John Macklefresh, of Baltimore county, praying a law to make valid the deed therein mentioned, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. T. B. Dorsey, Mr. Glenn and Mr. M'Elderry, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. T. B. Dorsey, from the committee, delivers a bill, entitled, An act to give validity and operation to the deed of conveyance therein mentioned; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

T H U R S D A Y, November 9, 1809.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to prevent the evil practices of sheriffs. ORDERED, That Mr. Glenn, Mr. Purnell and Mr. T. B. Dorsey, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. T. B. Dorsey, from the committee, delivers a bill, entitled, An act authorising John Hunter, late sheriff and collector of Baltimore county, to complete his collection; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

By the HOUSE of DELEGATES, November 11, 1809.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

WE propose on Wednesday next, if agreeable to your house, to go into a joint ballot for the election of a senator to represent this state in the senate of the United States; and to regulate the said election we have adopted the following resolution:
