

RESOLVED, That the person to be chosen shall be a resident of the western shore of the state of Maryland, and that the person having a majority of all the attending members of both houses of the general assembly, be declared duly elected to represent this state in the senate of the United States, and that a commission issue to the said senator appointed as aforesaid, signed by the governor for the time being, or in his absence by the presiding member of the council, in the following words, to wit: "The state of Maryland to _____, Great-
ing. The General Assembly of Maryland, reposing especial confidence in your integrity and abilities, have appointed you senator to represent this state in the senate of the United States from the present time to the fourth day of March, eighteen hundred and fifteen. Given under my hand, and the seal of this state, this _____ day of _____, eighteen hundred and _____."

The senate adjourns until Monday morning 9 o'clock.

M O N D A Y, November 13, 1809.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read. Mr. Robert Bowie and Mr. Lloyd Dorsey appeared in the senate, and after taking the oaths required by the constitution and form of government, and subscribing a declaration of their belief in the Christian religion, and taking the oath for the support of the government of the United States, took their seats.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following message:

Gentlemen of the Senate,

WITH the concurrence of your house, we propose to proceed, at 12 o'clock this day, to the election of a governor. Edward Lloyd, Esq. is put in nomination by us, and we have appointed Mr. Brent and Mr. Wharton to join such gentlemen as may be appointed by you to examine the ballots and to report thereon.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

By the S E N A T E, November 13, 1809.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

WE agree to proceed to the election of the governor at the time mentioned in your message, and have appointed Mr. Partridge and Mr. Pindell to join the gentlemen named by your house for the examination of the ballots. No person is put in nomination by the senate in addition to the gentleman named by you.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to alter and change the names of Samuel, William and Jacob Cole, to Samuel, William and Jacob Caple, and a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Patrick Gallaspy, of Caroline county, severally passed by that house November 13, 1809; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The senate, having previously qualified agreeably to the constitution and form of government, proceeded to the election of a governor; the ballot box being prepared, the ballots were deposited therein, sealed up and delivered to the committee of the senate appointed to meet the committee of the house of delegates, who retired to the conference room, and after sometime returned and reported, that Edward Lloyd had fifty-seven
