

of the fifteen per cent. interest chargeable on the principal of the balance due the state, on condition only that the said Wilkins, and his securities, shall punctually pay to the treasurer of the eastern shore, on or before the first day of January, eighteen hundred and eleven, the principal of the balance due the state, with interest on the same at the rate of six per cent. per annum, together with all costs on said judgment; provided, that the judgment aforesaid shall continue and be in force, notwithstanding the suspension directed by this resolution, and that if the said John Wilkins, and his securities, shall fail in the payment, they shall thereby forfeit the benefit of this resolution, and shall be liable to be proceeded against immediately for the whole of said debt and costs, and the fifteen per cent. interest now payable thereon.
