

NOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER SESSION, 1809.

The bill, entitled, An act to exempt the inhabitants of North and Pipe creek hundreds from tollage when they go to, or returning from, public worship, was read the second time by especial order, and the question put, Shall this bill pass? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Doctor Robert Moore, of Talbot county, was read the second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

S A T U R D A Y, January 6, 1810.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Glenn. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill, entitled, An act to ascertain and declare the condition of such issue as may hereafter be born of negro or mulatto female slaves during their servitude for years, and for other purposes therein mentioned, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act to repeal the fifth section of an act, entitled, An act for the confirming titles of land given to the use of the churches and several chapels within this province, empowering the commissioners of the respective counties, and vestries of the respective parishes, to take up certain parcels of land for the use of the same, the bill, entitled, An act to make the final discharge of executors, administrators and guardians, matter of record, the bill, entitled, An act to alter all such parts of the declaration of rights, constitution and form of government, as make it lawful to lay a general and equal tax for the support of the Christian religion, the bill, entitled, An act concerning costs in criminal prosecutions, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act concerning waste, was read the second time and will not pass. Sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution in favour of John Wilkins, and his securities, was read the second time, dissented from, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act to authorise a lottery to raise a sum of money for repairing the Protestant Episcopal church in the city of Annapolis, the bill, entitled, An act for the relief of William Boller, of Frederick county, the bill, entitled, An act to continue certain acts of assembly, and the bill, entitled, An act to lay out and make public a road in Baltimore county, were severally read the second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates returns the bill, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act for quieting possessions, and securing and confirming the estates of purchasers, passed by that house January 5, 1810. Ordered that the said bill be engrossed. Also delivers a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to lay out and straighten a road in Baltimore county, a bill, entitled, An act relating to the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, passed November session, eighteen hundred and seven, and of the several supplements thereto, severally passed by that house January 5, 1810; a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to lay out and open a road from the lower end of William
