

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER SESSION, 1810.

SATURDAY, November 17, 1810.

THE same members appeared as on yesterday, who adjourn until Monday morning.

MONDAY, November 19, 1810.

THE same members appeared as on Saturday. Mr. Lloyd Dorsey appeared in the senate. A sufficient number of members to compose a senate being convened, they severally qualified in the presence of each other before Nicholas Brewer, mayor of the city of Annapolis, agreeably to the constitution and form of government.

The senate then proceeded to the election of a president, and the ballots being deposited in the ballot box, on examination thereof it appeared, that the Honourable William Thomas, Esquire, was unanimously elected. Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that the Honourable William Thomas, Esquire, is unanimously elected president thereof.

Mr. Thomas Rogers was appointed clerk, and Mr. James Harwood assistant-clerk, who severally qualified as such.

Mr. Edward P. Roberts was appointed messenger, and Mr. Henry Thompson door-keeper, who severally qualified as such.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

By the SENATE, November 19, 1810.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

THE senate having a sufficient number of members to form a house, are ready to proceed to the business of the session, and propose to go into the choice of a governor immediately, and have appointed Stephen Lowrey and Robert Bowie, Esquires, to join such gentlemen as may be appointed by your house in the examination of the ballots. Edward Lloyd, Esquire, is put in nomination by the senate.

The president laid before the senate a letter from Mr. Richard Pindell, resigning his seat as a member of the senate; which was read.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following message:

By the HOUSE of DELEGATES, November 19, 1810.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

YOUR message of this morning we have received. We are ready to proceed to the choice of a governor immediately, and have appointed Mr. Marriott and Mr. Herbert to join the members named by your house for the examination of the ballots. No other person is put in nomination by this house than the gentleman named in your message.

Which was read.

The following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

By the SENATE, November 19, 1810.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

WE are desirous of appointing a council to the governor, and therefore propose to go into the election this day at twelve o'clock. Messrs. Reverdy Ghiselin, James Butcher, John Stephen, Thomas W. Hall and George E. Mitchell, are put in nomination by this house. We have appointed Mr. Lloyd Dorsey and Mr. Shriver, in conjunction with such gentlemen as you may appoint, to examine the ballots.

The senate, having previously qualified agreeably to the constitution and form of government, proceeded to the election of a governor; the ballot box being prepared. the ballots were deposited therein, sealed up and delivered to the committee of the senate appointed to meet the committee of the house of delegates, who retired to the conference room, and after some time returned and reported, that Edward Lloyd had fifty five votes, John E. Howard three votes. Levin Winder three votes, and Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, one vote.

Whereupon it is declared in the senate, that Edward Lloyd is duly elected governor of Maryland. The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill, entitled, An act to settle and ascertain the salary of the members of the council, for the ensuing year, passed by that house November 10, 1810; which was read the first and second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers the following message:

By the HOUSE of DELEGATES, November 19, 1810.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

THE honourable Edward Lloyd having been elected governor of the state of Maryland, we have pointed Mr. Groome and Mr. Gardiner, jointly with such gentlemen as shall be named by your house, to wait upon the governor, and request his attendance in the senate room to qualify according to the constitution and form of government.
