

THURSDAY, November 29, 1810.

THE senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. Fenwick asked and obtained leave of absence for a week from Sunday next.

The bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Margaret Widnor, of Harford county, and the bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act to direct descents, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act to lay out and open a road from the Franklin paper mill, on Gwynn's Falls, in Baltimore county, to the new Liberty road, was read the second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The resolution in favour of Mountjoy Bayly, was read the second time, dissented from, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

On the second reading of the following message, to wit:

By the SENATE, November 29, 1810.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

WE have dissented from the resolution in favour of Mountjoy Bayly, under an impression that the language of the resolution is not sufficiently explicit for the direction of the treasurer in adjusting the account to be submitted to him. If the house of delegates will originate a resolution, directing the payment by the treasurer of five years full pay as a captain in our late revolutionary war, without any interest thereon, in full of all claims he may have for his commutation pay, it will meet with the concurrence of the senate.

By the HOUSE of DELEGATES, November 29, 1810.

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to Jacob Eversole, or his order, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury, the sum of sixty-nine pounds nine shillings and ten-pence, with interest thereon from the thirteenth day of June, eighteen hundred and eight, until the time of passing this resolution, in full satisfaction of a decree obtained by him in the high court of chancery against the state of Maryland.

The bill, entitled, An act to appoint Thomas Harris, junior, of the city of Annapolis, trustee for the sale of the real estate of John Gwinn, Esquire, late of the said city, deceased, the bill, entitled, An act to repeal an act, entitled, An act for the more effectual preservation of the breed of wild deer in Dorchester county, and the bill, entitled, An act to give validity and operation to the deed of conveyance therein mentioned, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, An act respecting the registering of marriages, births and deaths, was read the second time and will not pass.
