Which was read:

Mr Tillotson delivers a bill entitled, An act annulling the marriage of Elizabeth Taylor, of Caroline county; which was read.

The bill to make valid the will of William Baird, late of Washington county, deceased, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The house resumed the consideration of the resolution relative to printing the laws, resolutions and proceedings of the legislature—and on motion by Mr. Jackson the question was put, That the following be inserted after the word volume? “provided there be comprised in the volume the acts and resolutions of four different sessions of the general assembly at least.” Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Frisby, the question was put, That the word “therefor,” be stricken out of the amendment first adopted?—Determined in the negative.

The question was then put, That the house assent to the said resolution. Resolved in the affirmative, and the resolution sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers a letter from the governor elect, notifying his acceptance; which was read.

Mr. Little delivers a bill entitled, An act to prevent the erection of booths within three miles of any Methodist camp or quarterly meeting in Queen-Anne’s county; which was read.

Mr. Randall delivers a petition from the proprietors of the Lanvale Woollen Factory, in Baltimore county, praying for a loan from the state; which was read and referred to Messrs. Randall, Donaldson, Brown, Pechin and Harryman.

Mr. Dooris delivers a bill entitled, An act for the benefit of Elizabeth McLain, of Talbot county. Mr. Long delivers a bill entitled, An act for the benefit of William Pollitt, junior, of Somerset county, an insolvent debtor; and Mr. Henry Hall delivers a bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, An act to empower the inhabitants of the town of Havre-de-Grace
