

On motion by Mr. Randall, the bill to keep in repair the public road leading from the Reisters town turnpike road, near the city of Baltimore, to the Windsor mills, was referred to the first day of June next.

The supplement to the act entitled, An act to incorporate the stockholders of the Union Bank of Maryland, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Harryman delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore county, praying for a road from near the late John Stephenson's to intersect the old York road near Jessop's mill; which was read and referred to Messrs. Harryman, Randall and Brown.

Mr. Donaldson delivers a bill entitled, An act declaring null and void the pretended marriage between Henry Moore, (a lunatic,) and a certain Alice Pearce, of Baltimore county, and providing for the care of the said lunatic's person and estate; which was read.

Mr. Howard delivers a petition from John J. Jacobs, a revolutionary officer, praying relief; which was read and referred to Messrs. Howard, Somervell and Belt.

Mr. Randall delivers a bill entitled, An act to compel the president and directors of the Reisters town turnpike road, to move their lower gate up to the intersection of the Liberty-town road; and a bill entitled, An act for the sale of the real estate of Abraham Larsh, late of Baltimore county, deceased; which were read.

Mr. Howard delivers a return from the clerk of Allegany county, relative to the attendance of the judges; which was read and referred to the committee of grievances and courts of justice.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to authorise the drawing of a lottery or lotteries in Middle-town, in Frederick county. The bill for the relief of Dominick Galt and John Thomas; the supplement to the act to empower the inhabitants of the town of Havre-de-Grace, to elect the commissioners thereof; and the bill to give validity to a deed from George M'Cullough and Isabella his wife, to David Strohm, severally endorsed, "will pass,"—ordered to be engrossed. The bill to empower Rebecca Candler and John Candler, administrators of William Candler, late sheriff and collector of Montgomery county to collect fees and county tax put into his hands for collection during his life-time, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed admendment;" which admendment was read, agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. The bill to prevent horses, cattle, sheep and swine from running at large within the limits therein described, endorsed, "will not pass;" and the resolution relative to the purchase of Mexcy's edition of the laws of Maryland, endorsed "assented to."
