

## VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

On motion by Mr. Thomas Jones, leave given to bring in a bill entitled, A further additional supplement to an act entitled, An act to incorporate companies to make several turnpike roads through Baltimore county, and for other purposes. *Ordered*, That Messrs. T. Jones, Swearingen and Shriver be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Downey delivers a bill entitled, An act to increase the allowance of the justices of the orphans' courts of the county or counties therein mentioned; which was read.

Mr. Ennalls delivers a bill entitled, An act to inflict a penalty on any person or persons who shall disturb the religious worship of the people called Methodists, or any other society, whilst in the discharge of their religious worship; which was read.

Mr. C. Dorsey delivers a petition from William Bruce, of Charles county, late a revolutionary officer, praying relief; which was read and referred to Messrs. C. Dorsey, Parnham and Rogerson.

On motion by Mr. C. Dorsey, the following resolution was read and assented to:

*Resolved*, That the governor and council be requested to furnish, for the use of the General Assembly of Maryland, nine copies of Kilty's Reports of the English Statutes.

The house adjourns until Monday morning 9 o'clock.

## MONDAY, NOVEMBER 25, 1811.

THE House met.—The Speaker appears and resumes the chair.—Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

The resolution relative to Kilty's reports of the English statutes was sent to the senate.

The Speaker laid before the house a return from the clerk of Charles county, relative to the attendance of the judges; which was read and referred to the committee of grievances and courts of justice.

Mr. John S. Moffitt, a delegate returned for Cecil county, appeared; and after qualifying in the mode prescribed by the constitution and form of government; and taking an oath to support the constitution of the United States, took his seat in the house.

Mr. Harryman delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore, Harford and Cecil counties, praying for a bridge over the great falls of Gunpowder river; which was read and referred to Messrs. Harryman, Veazey, Swearingen, H. Hall, Randall, Bowles and Moffitt.

The Speaker laid before the house a letter from the treasurer of the Eastern Shore, enclosing an account of the receipts and expenditures of the Eastern Shore treasury for the year ending the 31st ultimo; a list of balances due on the treasury books, and the treasurer's account current with the state; which were read and referred to the committee of claims.
