Mr. Ennalls delivers a bill entitled, A supplement to the act of seventeen hundred and eighty five, and the supplementary acts thereto, which provide for the poor of Dorchester county; and Mr. Donaldson delivers a bill entitled, An act for the relief of Edward B. Lowry, of the city of Baltimore; which were read.

The supplement to the act entitled, An act authorising commissioners to make sale of the land of which William Warman Berry died possessed, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Donaldson, leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act relating to vagrants in the city of Baltimore; and to repeal the act of assembly therein named. *Ordered*, That Messrs. Donaldson, C. Dorsey and Frisby, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Harryman delivers a bill entitled, An act to survey and lay out a road from near the dwelling of the late John Stevenson to intersect the old York road near Jessop's mill; which was read.

Mr. Donaldson delivers a petition from Collin M'Kenzie and James Smyth, of the city of Baltimore, attending physicians to the hospital in the vicinity thereof, praying legislative aid for the completion of the same; which was read and referred to Messrs. Donaldson, C. Dorsey, Frisby, A. Dorsey, Groome, Veazey and Jackson.

The bill for the sale of the real estate of Abraham Larsh, of Baltimore county, deceased, was read the second time; and on motion by Mr. Randall was recommitted for amendment.
