Randall delivers the said bill; which was read the first and second

time by special order, passed and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the further supplement to the act entitled, An act to regulate the inspection of tobacco; the bill for the relief of George Gassaway; the bill to authorise and empower the levy court of Prince George's county to assess a sum of money for the purpose therein mentioned; and the further additional supplement to an act entitled, An act to incorporate companies to make several turnpike roads through Baltimore county and for other purposes, severally endorsed "will pass;" ordered to be engrossed. Also the supplement to an act for the benefit of Elizabeth Cole of Baltimore county, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read, agreed to and the bill ordered to be engrossed; and a bill entitled, A supplement to an act to reduce into one the several acts of assembly respecting elections and to regulate said elections; which was read.

The bill to lay out a road from Richard Britain's mill and manufactory to intersect M'Mechen's road at Tudor's lane in Baltimore county; and the supplement to the act, entitled, An act to make public a road in Prince George's county, were read the se-

cond time and passed.

Mr. T. N. Williams delivers a petition from William Taylor, of Worcester county, a revolutionary soldier, praying he may be authorised to retail spirituous liquor without paying for a licence therefor; which was read and referred to Messrs. T. N. Williams,

Handy and Quinton.

Mr. Wilson delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Worcester county, praying for an alley from Scarborough alley through the old church lot till it intersects Church-alley in Snow Hill; which was read and referred to Messrs. Wilson, Handy and Quinton. Also petitions from Levi Carey and James Davidson Johnson, praying to be supported by said county; which were read and referred to Messrs. Wilson, I. N. Williams and Handy.—And a petition from sundry inhabitants of said county, praying for a road from near William Pownsend's to intersect the Salisbury road; which was read and referred to Messrs. Wilson, T. N. Williams and Handy.
