Also the bill making an uniform provision for the surviving officers and soldiers of the late Maryland line, in the revolutionary war, and for others, endorsed, "will not pass;" and the following message:

## BY THE SENATE, December 11, 1811.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We have received your message accompanying the bill entitled, "An act to increase the allowance of the justices of the orphans' court of the counties therein mentioned;" and requesting a reconsideration of the same. Seeing no good reasons why we should do so; but on the contrary, viewing an increase of allowance in a few counties, as only a commencement, that in a few years would lead to a general rise throughout the state; and considering the per diem at present received by the members of the orphans' court, as sufficient to cover all ordinary expenses, we do not feel inclined to yield to your request for a re-consideration. Every individual owes something to the community of which he forms a part; and while rendering services general in their nature, and taking up but a small portion of his time; the consideration of the claims the public fairly has upon us for a portion of those services, lessens the obligation to make a pecuniary reward for them beyond a moderate allowance for expenses.
