

ed and selected by the directors of the company created by this act, shall be commissioners to select and agree on the point from which the said road shall commence as aforesaid; and if the said commissioners, so as aforesaid appointed, cannot agree, that then and in such case the said persons shall proceed to select some other fit and proper person to aid and assist them in the selection of the point from which the said road shall commence; and if they or a majority of them cannot agree in the choice of such person, then and in that case the said persons, or a majority of them shall proceed to draw lots for such person; and that if the said James M. Lingan or Upton Beall, or either of them shall depart this life, or refuse to act, that then it shall be lawful for the directors of the Potomac Company for the time being to fill up such vacancy, who shall be vested with all the powers which the said Lingan and Beall are hereby vested with?" Resolved in the affirmative.

The question was then put, Shall the said bill pass?
