TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 19, 1811.

The senate met.—Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. MacCreery from the committee delivers a bill entitled, An act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the city of Baltimore to the District of Columbia, toward the city of Washington, which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The amendments to the resolution relative to printing the acts and resolutions, and the votes and proceedings of the General Assembly, were read the second time and assented to.

On motion, leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act authorizing the holding of a court of chancery on the Eastern Shore. Ordered, That Messrs. Lloyd, Williams and Dorsay be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, An act for opening and extending a street and communication between Gough and Wolfe-streets, in the city of Baltimore, passed by that house Nov. 14, 1811; and a bill entitled, An act for the relief of John Hassard and Ralph Aassard, of the city of Baltimore, passed by that house Nov. 19, 1811; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, An additional supplement to an act entitled, An act to establish a market and to build a market house in the western precincts of Baltimore and for the regulation of the same, passed by that house Nov. 19, 1811; which was read the first and second time by special order, passed and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.
