THE Senate met.—Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. MacCreery. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Moses Tabbs appeared in the senate, qualified and took his seat.

The bill entitled, An act to authorise the levy court of Washington county to appoint commissioners to lay off a road therein mentioned; and the bill entitled, An act for the relief of Abraham Fuller, an insolvent debtor of the city of Baltimore, were sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The president laid before the senate a report of the president and trustees of Charlotte Hall school; which was read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivers a bill entitled, An act to dispose of certain lots therein specified in Somerset county, passed by that house Nov. 22, 1811; a bill entitled, An act for the benefit of Thomas Willmore and Henrietta his wife, of Anne Arundel county; and a bill entitled, An act for the benefit of John Deitrick Krantz, of Frederick county, severally passed by that house Nov. 23, 1811; which were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.
