On motion, the question was put, Will the senate re-consider the bill entitled, An act to increase the allowance of the justices of the orphans' court of the counties therein mentioned? Determined in the negative.

BY THE SENATE, Dec. 11, 1811.

Sentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We have received your message accompanying the bill entitled, An act to increase the allowance of the justices of the orphans' courts of the counties therein mentioned, and requesting a re-consideration of the same. Seeing no good reasons why we should do so, but on the contrary viewing an increase of allowance in a few counties as only a commencement, that in a few years would lead to a general rise throughout the state, and considering the per diem at present received by the members of the orphans' court, as sufficient to cover all ordinary expenses, we do not feel inclined to yield to your request for a re-consideration.
